30 Million Thanks

In 2015, donations to the Retirement Fund for Religious (RFR) totaled \$30,773,908.87.

As a result of this tremendous generosity, the National Religious Retirement Office (NRRO) distributed financial assistance to help hundreds of religious communities meet the immediate and ongoing care needs of elderly members. Proceeds from the appeal also enabled the NRRO to furnish targeted financial and consultative assistance to religious communities with critical funding deficits and to provide programming and education to foster quality eldercare and comprehensive retirement planning. Nearly 33,000 senior sisters, brothers, and religious order priests benefit from the financial support and services the RFR makes possible.

Direct Care Assistance: Help for Today and Tomorrow

As a result of the 2015 Retirement Fund for Religious (RFR) collection, the National Religious Retirement Office (NRRO) distributed \$25 million in Direct Care Assistance to 401 religious communities across the United States.

Each year, roughly 80 to 90 percent of the collection proceeds are disbursed as Direct Care Assistance. This support is a per capita allocation based on the number of members age 60 and over and weighted for a variety of factors, including level of need. Religious communities utilize this funding to help meet such immediate expenses as nursing care and prescription medications. They also combine it with their own income and savings to provide for long-term retirement and eldercare needs.



The majority of proceeds from the RFR collection are distributed as Direct Care Assistance, which helps religious congregations underwrite ongoing retirement needs, including prescription medications and nursing care.




Planning and Implementation Assistance: A Formula for Success

In 2015, more than \$5 million was distributed in Planning and Implementation (P and I) Assistance.

The P and I program is a comprehensive, 12- to 24-month process that provides targeted consultative and financial assistance to help severely underfunded religious communities increase the capacity to provide for aging members. From 2009 to 2015, 117 religious institutes entered this process, working hand-in-hand with NRRO consultants to identify and address their most pressing retirement-funding challenges. As a result, some of these communities are now adequately funded for retirement; others have made significant progress in stabilizing current retirement savings and planning for the future.

Measuring the Impact

In 2015, an evaluation of Planning and Implementation Assistance, made possible through a grant from the Conrad N. Hilton Foundation, was conducted by an independent accounting and management consulting firm. This analysis measured the impact of financial assistance for religious institutes that had completed the process at least one year prior to the assessment. The results demonstrated that 81 percent of participating institutes showed marked improvement in the level of funding.



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Educational and Consultative Assistance: Proactive Planning

Proceeds from the Retirement Fund for Religious are helping younger communities plan now for their future needs.

In April 2015, the NRRO welcomed four communities with a median age of 45 or younger into the Planning and Implementation Assistance program and conducted a workshop designed specifically for them. Each lacks sufficient savings to fund retirement. However, because most or all of their members are still in active ministry, they have ample time to implement strategies that will enable them to continue important ministries for the People of God while setting aside adequate funding for their eventual retirement needs.

Other Assistance

Distributed **\$196,346.15 in Management and Education Assistance** to promote ongoing education in retirement and financial planning.

Funded by a grant from the Conrad N. Hilton Foundation, hosted **two thinktank gatherings** aimed at developing educational opportunities related to property planning and management.

In conjunction with the Avila Institute of Gerontology, hosted **four webinars** to support caregivers and leadership in providing quality eldercare. Calculated **550 Retirement Needs Analyses** to help religious institutes realistically assess retirement needs and plan for the future.

Coordinated **25 on-site volunteer consultations** to provide religious communities with hands-on support from experts in community leadership, eldercare, and financial planning.

Paying It Forward: Sister Fran's Story

When the Congregation of Divine Providence of Melbourne, Kentucky, entered Planning and Implementation Assistance in April 2010, Sister Fran Moore was having a lot of sleepless nights.

As provincial superior, she and her leadership team wrestled daily with how to fund care for senior members while maintaining an expansive motherhouse that no longer met the community's needs. Participation in Planning and Implementation Assistance, along with the congregations' own hard work and sacrifice, enabled the community to sell the facility and erect a modest provincial headquarters adjacent to their existing retirement center. The Diocese of Covington purchased the motherhouse (*pictured below*) for use as a retreat center, and the sisters were thrilled to see their beloved home utilized for a purpose in keeping with their mission.

Within two years, the community improved their level of funding by more than 30 percent and by 2015 were adequately funded for retirement. Although

they no longer qualify for financial assistance from the Retirement Fund for Religious, they still benefit from the educational programming and eldercare resources the collection makes possible.








The National Religious Retirement Office (NRRO) and its sponsoring organizations take seriously the fiduciary responsibilities associated with administering the proceeds of the Retirement Fund for Religious (RFR) collection. Each year, they strive to disburse approximately 95 percent of donations to religious communities. The remainder, about 5 percent, is allocated for the promotion of the appeal, administrative expenses, and savings for future distributions. The chart below reflects contributions to the 2015 RFR collection and distributions to religious communities.

2015 Financial Summary



*Financial distributions include expenditures from the Retirement Fund for Religious surplus. This surplus accumulated from investment income and funds budgeted for Planning and Implementation Assistance in prior years but not disbursed.

A detailed financial statement for the NRRO can be accessed at www.retiredreligious.org. The financial operations of the NRRO are included in the annual financial audit of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). The USCCB's most recent consolidated statement of financial position can be viewed at www.usccb.org/about/financial-reporting/. In order to maximize financial returns while promoting long-term stability, the NRRO's investments are pooled with those of six other national collections housed within the USCCB and managed by independent investment advisors.
