

Donors Make Our Mission Possible

The National Religious Retirement Office (NRRO) was established in 1988 with the specific mission of helping US religious communities meet their retirement-funding needs.

For this purpose, the NRRO coordinates the annual national Retirement Fund for Religious appeal, which has raised more than \$975 million over the last 35 years to support the



retirement needs of aging women and men religious. In 2022 alone, the Retirement Fund for Religious raised \$27.6 million and distributed financial assistance to 297 religious communities to support the needs of aging vowed religious.

Over the years, the tremendous generosity of thousands of donors, steadfast in their support for the collection, has enabled the NRRO to provide financial aid, consultative assistance and an array of educational resources to hundreds of religious communities in the United States.


In doing so, the NRRO remains relevant to those it serves, and its mission remains possible.

Donors Make Sister Joan Flores's Lifelong Mission Possible

Joan Flores, 82, a Sister of the Holy Family, was born in Belize, where her father was a teacher who worked alongside missionaries.

At a young age, she was inspired by both the Jesuit missionaries and the Sisters of the Holy Family in her home country.

In 1959, after graduating from high school, she traveled to the United States and entered the Sisters of the Holy Family.

Through the years, she ministered in Catholic education in the United States and at a high school in Belize.

After retiring from teaching in 2005, Sister Joan began assisting the elderly members of her community and also volunteered at a nearby preschool and kindergarten.

Today, she continues to help with activities at her community's motherhouse in New Orleans, Louisiana, where she resides.

Annual distributions of Direct Care Assistance help her community meet its retirement expenses.

Through their support of the Retirement Fund for Religious, donors help to ensure the ongoing provision of care for the aging members of Sister Joan's community, enabling them to continue their dedicated mission in service to others.

Our Mission in Action

Financial Assistance

The Retirement Fund for Religious was established in 1988 to help religious communities provide for senior members' current and future retirement and health-care needs. Each year, nearly 95 percent of our budget is distributed to support the direct care of aging sisters, brothers and religious order priests.

Direct Care Assistance: \$25 million

Gifts to the 2022 collection enabled the National Religious Retirement Office (NRRO) to distribute \$25 million in Direct Care Assistance to 297 eligible religious communities across the United States. Communities apply annually for Direct Care Assistance and, if their applications are accepted, combine these supplemental funds with their income and savings to meet retirement needs, including nursing care and medications.

Management and Continuing Education Assistance: \$131,122

The NRRO provides Management and Continuing Education Assistance to help religious communities with their financial and retirement-related education needs.

Religious communities can apply for up to \$5,000 per calendar year to cover the costs of workshops, conferences and other continuing education opportunities. This funding may also be used to purchase management tools, such as financial software or fiscal and demographic analyses.

Services

Eldercare Consultation Service

The NRRO offers a consultation service to assist religious communities in planning and evaluating care delivery for their elderly members.

NRRO consultants meet with community leadership, assess cost effectiveness and quality, identify areas for improvement, help with future retirement planning, review management policies and procedures and recommend follow-up steps based on their findings.

Retirement Needs Analysis

The NRRO provides additional support to religious communities through a Retirement Needs Analysis to aid their retirement planning.

A Retirement Needs Analysis is a statistical tool that helps religious communities plan for future retirement expenses. It estimates the costs associated with caring for their elder members and helps communities understand the financial implications of supporting those members. By offering this resource, the NRRO aims to support religious communities in making informed decisions about retirement planning in order to ensure they can provide high-quality care for their elderly members.

Online and Other Support Resources

Quarterly Webinars

Hosted in partnership with the Avila Institute of Gerontology, the NRRO webinar series provides care professionals with updates on eldercare trends and continuing education. These hour-long virtual sessions are held quarterly and are free to attend; recordings are available afterward and in an online archive of past sessions.

Video Series

The following three video series are freely available online through the NRRO. These videos are produced for religious communities that prefer to learn at their own pace.

Tending the Vineyard covers property planning over the course of five videos plus support materials. This series offers important information to property experts and religious individuals who have completed congregational property projects.



Walking Together provides virtual workshops to explore

aspects of caring for persons with dementia. The series is an essential resource for caregivers and health-care professionals seeking to enhance their understanding and practice in dementia care.

Basic Elements of a Comprehensive Retirement Plan, a newly released five-part video workshop, provides information for building a comprehensive retirement plan for communities of all sizes and types.



Publications

The NRRO produces several publications that offer a wealth of information on retirement and eldercare for religious communities and care professionals. The *Engaging Aging* newsletter provides professional updates, success stories, best practices and information about aging. The *NRRO Newsletter* offers updates and events important to religious communities and others.

Statistical Report

This report, released each August, summarizes the state of retirement for women and men religious, including their communities' census data, cost of care, retirement-funding status and Direct Care Assistance funding information.




